# MR HATCHARD "MADE A DIFFERENCE TO MY LIFE" LEADING THE WAY DEVELOPING NATIONAL TEACHER RECRUITMENT

You may have read in the national press about the real problem in recruiting the number of teachers that are needed in secondary schools across England and Wales. This is a cause of significant concern in many secondary schools across the county and nationwide with increasing numbers of non-specialists teaching core subjects or schools failing to make any appointment to vacancies they have.

The Department for Education recently asked the news organisation that publish The Times to run a series of articles that highlights what a wonderful job it is to be a teacher. Our very own Mr Hatchard was asked to feature in a video and article to be published on The Times online and in The Times magazine. An ex-student had completed a form to say that Mr Hatchard had "made a difference to his life" and that he had much to thank him for.

During the Easter holidays, Mr Hatchard, was filmed talking about teaching and surprised his ex-student, Will, by walking through the door just as Will was asked, "what would you like to say to Mr Hatchard if you had the chance?" The answer Will gave is heartwarming and, we know, symptomatic of how many students feel about their staff.

He spoke of how Mr Hatchard inspired confidence in him despite being upset about moving down a set in Year 9, that he made him believe that he could achieve highly (no matter what group he was in) Will went on to get an A in English Literature and B in Language and to choose English Literature as an Alevel. Furthermore, Will described how Mr Hatchard always had the time for each student and made them feel like they were treated as individuals.

Mr Hatchard is rightly proud of this feedback but feels he did nothing special; it seems "just doing what I did every day in the classroom had a profound impact". Will is now a lifecoach and has recently had a book on the field published.

# Message from the Headteacher, Caroline Barlow

Whilst it has been fantastic these last two weeks to see students back after the Easter break, and particularly to see Year 10 and 11 so focused on their exams ahead, thoughts at the College have been distracted by the very sad news that over Easter Mr Gully had passed away. A loss at any time is hard to bear but one, so relatively young with a vibrant family, is particularly difficult.

This Friday the College closes at 12.20pm to allow the large number of staff, governors and many wider members of the College community to attend the funeral of a man who gave a significant portion of his teaching career to students at Heathfield Community College. Many students, present and past have contributed to a memorial book which we are collating for the family. The comments are poignant and personal but universally describe an outstanding teacher and a passionate advocate of Science.

It is an important moment as a community to reflect on the contribution he made, the lives he touched and the many careers inspired by Chris. A powerful, inspirational teacher is a wonderful thing to encounter and there are many of us that can give thanks for that, certainly Chris is remembered warmly by many many students and colleagues, past and present, for which both they and we are truly grateful.

Whether individually touched by this loss or other recent loss, this is another reminder of the importance of the strength that can be drawn from our positive community. There was a tangible sense of kindness about the College over the last two weeks, even more than usual. It makes me very proud to be able to lead such a compassionate school.

Chris encouraged students in ways that embody our Habits and values: to be ambitious and believe they could succeed, to be determined and resilient in the face of difficulty. He will be missed greatly but the legacy of these values will remain a strong part of who we are and what we do. Thank you Mr Gully.

Following preparation in PSHEe lessons, Mrs Chapman, Ms Grant and tutors were really proud of how students were able to focus their research to ensure they had the most powerful and useful conversations with all manner of employers, training and HE providers and volunteering organisations.



## WUTHERING HEIGHTS PILGRIMAGE TO YORKSHIRE

In the final week of Term 4, Y12 made a literary pilgrimage to Yorkshire to visit the home of the Brontës, braving wintry weather and impressing everyone they met with their enthusiasm, curiosity and courtesy.



Emily Brontë's 1847 novel Wuthering Heights tells a story of passionate love and vengeance in the wild Yorkshire moors, the setting for the Brontë sisters' own upbringing. Visiting their home in the town of Haworth, as well as walking the moors, was an exciting and eye-opening experience for us all.

In true Wuthering Heights fashion, we arrived in Haworth to a brooding overcast sky that soon began to spit rain. Not to be deterred—if anything, the weather helped us get into the Gothic mood—we explored the town's cobbled streets. The church, in which the Brontës' father was a priest, overlooks Haworth with a looming and powerful presence. From there we visited the Brontë Parsonage Museum, where the siblings were raised. With each room a mirror of how it would have been over a century ago when the Brontës lived,

breathed, and wrote in them, you could almost imagine their ghosts still lingered. We were also lucky to attend a lecture on the Brontës' lives, an informative experience that gave us insight into the events that shaped their famous novels.

An early start the next day brought us to a fascinating lecture on Wuthering Heights, conducted in the very schoolroom where the Brontës once taught. It was both eerie and enthralling to stand where they once stood. Soon after, we embarked on a tour through the graveyard, where the ancient, crooked headstones provided a clear look into the world that influenced Emily Brontë so heavily. It was a steep climb from there to the moors. Battered by vicious wind and stung by typical Yorkshire cold, we crested the highest hill to a view of the wild, untamed world of Wuthering Heights.

Throughout Term 4, students in our Year 9 GCSE Business Studies class took part in a national competition organised through the Young Enterprise Tenner Challenge.



Over a four-week time period our students were given £10 to get their student business ideas off the ground and make as much profit as they could. Students worked in small teams in direct competition with fellow students in the class as well as other students across the country. The business ideas ranged from washing cars, cleaning football boots, selling cakes or sweets to homemade dog treats.

During the four weeks' students developed their entrepreneurial skills by completing a range of tasks, including; Market Research, Logo Design, Idea Generation, Sourcing Materials or Products, Sales Pitches, Promotional Materials and Costing.

"In my opinion, the Tenner Challenge is an extremely important part of a Business student's education. This is because we learn how to work as a team and collaborate in our ideas. It also provides teenagers with an insight to the real working, entrepreneurial world and teaches you qualities such as, confidence, management, effective communication, conscientiousness, organisation, resilience and leadership. Furthermore, this challenge provides us, as students with an opportunity to raise our aspirations and transfer our prior knowledge about Mathematics and English to real life situations, such as writing reports and producing financial spreadsheets. Personally, I feel that the Tenner Challenge is a fabulous way to link school learning to future careers and I found this a comfortable transition from school to a working environment, where I learned to understand business functions. # HELP YOUR CHILD UPDATE THEIR SOCIAL MEDIA PERSONAL DETAILS AND PRIVACY SETTINGS

We know from our student voice surveys that a very large percentage of our students have social media accounts, some of them when they are still too young to, officially, use them. Lots of them say that their Mums and Dads have signed them up. Others say that they did it themselves, using fake accounts.

They also say that this all happened years ago. There is nothing illegal in this but bear in mind that an 8 year old that is signed up to a social media service has to say that they are 13 when they are not. By the time that 8 year old is 13, their social media account is telling everyone on the internet that they are now 18. If an adult tries to groom your 13 year old child on this social media site, they will be able to argue that they thought they were talking to another adult.

If any of this applies to your family, remember to get children to update their social media personal details when they are 13 so that it shows the correct age, check their privacy settings (close friends only?) and talk to them about which pictures they are posting of themselves. Help them to know what is responsible behaviour on the internet and so help them to keep themselves safe.
