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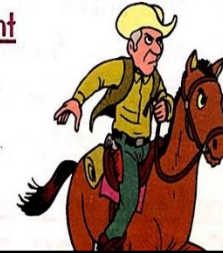
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The Beef Bonanza and the Cattle Trails

The Beef Bonanza was an epic business while it lasted.

The Beef Bonanza began in Texas

- 1) Open ranching of cattle started in Mexico. Texas rebelled against Mexico in 1835, and joined the USA in 1845. Many Mexicans were driven out, leaving their cattle to American ranchers.
- 2) The Anglo-American settlers brought their own cattle with them, some descended from English Longhorns. Their cattle interbred with Mexican Criollos, producing the famous Texas Longhorn.
- 3) Many Texans left their ranches to fight in the Civil War (1861-1865). While they were away their cattle continued to breed. Charles Goodnight left behind 180 cattle, but returned in 1865 to find he owned 5000.
- 4) Increased popularity of beef in the 1850s had made it worthwhile for Texan ranchers to drive cattle northwards (where they could make more money at market).
