DUKE OF EDINBURGH AWARD SCHEME: EXPEDITION READY



Sunday 19th May was the final training walk of 2019 designed to check our teamwork and navigation skills before the assessed expeditions in June and July. Our 5 bronze teams, and the silver group, met in unfamiliar territory for this final challenge, congregating in light drizzle, in an Alfriston car park with our intrepid team of staff support: Ms Dalby, Norman, Harker, Flynn and Hammond, with Mr Hammond joining our adventure as another volunteer.

As the teams have to navigate under remote supervision (without adults) during the actual expedition, we decided to practice this during our 12km walk. The main group would walk with the adult volunteers but we would have two groups off the front at 10 minute intervals and a group off the back rotating positions after every checkpoint.

The silvers led off navigating to the first checkpoint solo where Miss Harker met them. After the rendezvous, the silvers continued on to checkpoint two whilst Miss Harker waited for the first bronze team ten minutes later, before meeting the silver group again at checkpoint 2. This leap frog process continued for the first 6 checkpoints before we all congregated for lunch together at High and Over.

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
EXAM TIME IN THE ART DEPARTMENT





TOWNER GALLERY 'DRAW ME IN' PROJECT

Members of the Art Super Curricular Club have been working on a collaborative sculpture inspired by works in the Towner Gallery collection: Box of Heads (Studies for The Banquet Sculpture), Ana Maria Pacheco, 1983 and Harbinger Bird III, Elisabeth Frink. After several workshops using different media to explore ideas, and a trip to the Towner gallery, the students created their own sculpture entitled 'Dreams and Nightmares'.

Dreams are lots of muddled things, unpredictable, and often disjointed. The installation aims to show the transition between our phobias, fears, the nightmares and our dreams, moving from the more sinister humanoid to the lighter familiar imagery of animals. The faces were made from: paper, wire, glue, plasticine, thread. The projections were designed on ipads to remind us that our fears are never far away and can overwhelm our dreams. But our dreams will always sit on top of our fears as a beacon of hope.

The sculpture has been on display in the Towner Gallery throughout April and May as part of the 'Draw Me In' Young People's exhibition. On 30th April members of the club visited the exhibition and were delighted to see their work in such a prestigious gallery. They particularly enjoyed seeing what other groups had done inspired by art work in the gallery's collection and many were inspired to draw other artworks and note down ideas for future projects.

One of the real successes of this project was how the students of different ages worked so well together. The Year 11 leaders Atholl Martin, Eleanor Rofe, Eva Scotland and Elisa Spencer developed the workshops and tested the techniques before the main project started with Year 7 and 8 students. They were exceptional in the way they challenged the younger students to find out more about the artworks inspiring the project and made the sessions run smoothly, leading small groups and helping them to develop the narrative for the project.



It was great working with this group and I am very proud of what they achieved. You can see their sculpture at our GCSE and A Level exhibition on the 19th June.

PROGRESSION & EMPLOYABILITY



As part of our ongoing commitment to support students in their ability to plan best for their future we recently ran two Drop Down Curriculum Days for all of Y9 and 10. Y10 were first and the focus for them was progression.

A major pivot for the day was our trip to <https://bigfuturesshow.org.uk/>. Following preparation in PSHE lessons Y10 had the chance to find out about potential College courses and volunteering opportunities as well as networking with a number of employers. The employers represented included: the Armed Forces, local hotels, a range of NHS providers, a number of accountancy

and law firms and engineering and software companies.

Whilst back at College Y10 were on a carousel of activities. These ranged from: a presentation on the perils and pitfalls of university, information from East Sussex College about their range of vocational courses, mock interviews and a game of 'What's My Line?' Our 'What's My Line?'

Guests ranged from Heathfield alumni who are professional musicians and yoga teachers, to our Enterprise Adviser who is a strengths and skills coach to parents who are self employed IFAs and HR Managers for 5 Star Hotel chains.

Y9 had the opportunity to work with product designers, marketing officers from Dairy Crest, self employed game designers, chemical engineers from Wrightflow Technologies and solicitors from Kay and Pascoe.

The day for Y9 followed and was all about employability. After a successful bid to the Careers and Enterprise Company, we were able to fund two organisations: Creative Cafe who are based in Sussex and the EY Foundation to run the day and ensure that all of the yeargroup had encounters with a number of employers from a range of sectors. Both organisations incorporated enterprise activities from designing and making t-shirts to decompressing marshmallows and reverse constructing cardboard packaging.

- Additional board games as requested by students to run lunchtime activities inside.



ON-LINE SAFETY

SEXTING

Did you know that surveys of teenagers suggest that school students think that sending revealing photos of themselves to boyfriends or girlfriends, or just posting them on social media, is “normal” even though at the same time they feel that they are being pressurised into doing something that they don’t want to do. They are doing it because they think it is “normal”.



The report says that they think it is expected as a normal part of having a relationship. Girls in the survey said that “unwanted touching” from both boys and girls happens all the time and that if they complain they are told that it was just “banter”.

In reality, this is sexual harassment and it is bullying, whether it comes from boys or girls. If you feel pressurised into doing something that you are uncomfortable with or don’t want to do, then you are right: don’t do it and tell a trusted adult.

More worryingly, even if you don’t feel pressurised, sexting is about making a digital image of yourself available on the internet. Once it is on the internet, it is always there; deleting it won’t stop other people from seeing it.

Instagram, Snapchat, WhatsApp and other ways of sharing photos aren’t as private as you think. If you share revealing digital photos of yourself you are really saying: “I don’t mind my parents seeing this” or “I don’t mind the whole school seeing this” or “I don’t mind the adult that is interviewing me for a job seeing this”. Do you really not mind these things?

Ticks

how to protect yourself

Information about tick bites

Playing outdoors is great fun and lots of exercise will help you grow strong and keep healthy. But remember to **look out** for ticks!

What are ticks?

Ticks are small, spider-like mini beasts that feed on the blood of animals, including people.

Ticks don't fly or jump, but live in long grass, bushes and shrubs. You can find them in the woods, places with long grass, and sometimes parks and gardens. Ticks wait on the tips of plants and when you brush past, they climb on.

Fascinating Fact

Ticks are **arachnids**, so are related to spiders.



Fascinating Fact

Ticks only **feed once** for a few days during a whole year.

A beastly bite

Remember to do a tick check!

How many ticks can you find?



- A tick will stay on your body for several days to feed on your blood.
- Tick bites may not hurt so you won't know if you've been bitten.
- Ticks are tiny and can look like a speck of dirt or a freckle.
- Ticks often like to hide behind your ears, on your neck and head, in your underarms, behind your knees or between your toes.
- After playing outside, ask your parent or a grown up you trust to check you for ticks.
- Remove ticks as soon as possible

Fascinating Fact

Ticks have **four stages** in their life cycle – the eggs, larvae, nymphs and adults.

Why should I look out for ticks?

You don't need to be scared of ticks, but it is important to look out for them and remove any you find.

Some ticks can carry diseases, like **Lyme disease**, that can make you sick so it's important to know what ticks are and what to do if you get bitten.

Fascinating Fact

Tick saliva contains **special chemicals** so you don't feel it when they bite.



Oh no, I've found a tick!

If you find a tick, ask your parent or grown up to remove it as soon as possible.

Remove the tick safely

- Using a special tick tool or pointy tweezers.
- Grab the tick as close to the skin as possible and pull up and out.
- After the tick has been removed, wash the place where it bit you with soap and water.



Fascinating Fact

Ticks feed on lots of different animals, so you may find them on your pets too!

What do I do now?

- Sometimes, a tick can carry bacteria that make you sick.
- You may find a red rash where you were bitten several days or weeks later.
- Not everyone who gets sick will have a rash.
- You may have a temperature, headache and feel sore.
- If you begin to feel poorly, tell your parent so they can take you to see your doctor
- Remember to tell them you have been bitten by a tick. They will give you medicines to make you better.
- **Remember**, not all tick bites will make you sick.



How to stop ticks biting you

- Wear long trousers and tops with long sleeves to stop ticks getting to your skin
- Wear light coloured clothes – the ticks are easier to spot and can be brushed off.
- Use an anti-insect spray to stop ticks from attaching.
- Remember to do a tick check after playing outside.
