Context

- Malorie Blackman is a black British author who often writes about social and ethical issues, particularly around race and identity.
- Noughts & Crosses is a modern text (2001) which explores the issues of racism in the modern day.
- Many people might think that large-scale racism is confined to history, but Blackman uses her novel to point out that this might not be the case.
- Historically in the West, white populations have had economic, social and cultural dominance over black populations.
- Slavery was outlawed in the USA in 1865, but it wasn't until at least 1941 that specific laws against segregation and racial inequality were introduced.
- Apartheid (see keywords) in South Africa was not abolished until 1991.
